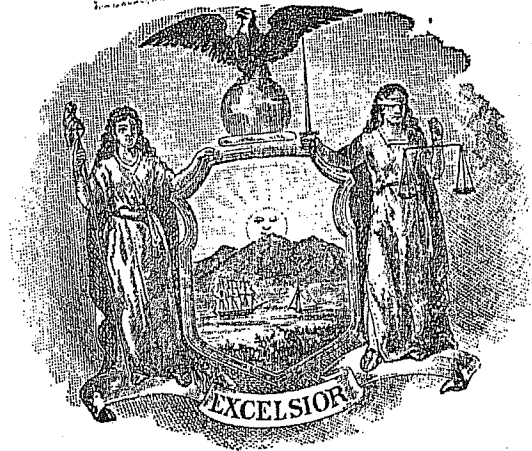

as amended by chapter 323 of the Laws of 1885," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on excise.

Mr. Gordon introduced a bill entitled "An act authorizing the construction of an iron bridge over the Erie canal at Main street, in the city of Lockport," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time.

On motion of Mr. Gordon, and by unanimous consent, the rules were suspended, and said bill ordered to a third reading and printed.

Also, a bill entitled "An act authorizing the board of supervisors of the county of Niagara to raise by tax and pay money to the city treasurer of the city of Lockport, to reimburse the city of Lockport for money paid for laying the Niagara street water pipe," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on internal affairs.

Mr. Bates introduced a bill entitled "An act to promote the construction of out-fall channels for the drainage of large swamps," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on general laws.

Mr. J. S. Allen introduced a bill entitled "An act to authorize the treasurer and receiver of taxes of Long Island City to collect, by sale, unpaid taxes levied and imposed by the board of supervisors of Queens county against Long Island City, for State and county purposes," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on affairs of cities.

Mr. Collins introduced a bill entitled "An act in relation to extending Fourth street in the city of Troy, from Madison street to Ida street, and constructing a bridge over the Poestenkill creek in said city," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on affairs of cities.

Mr. Curtis introduced a bill entitled "An act to authorize the appointment of commissioners to locate an asylum for the chronic insane in northern New York," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on ways and means.

Mr. Wolf introduced a bill entitled "An act relating to marriage licenses, providing for officers herein indicated to issue licenses for parties to marry," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on the judiciary.

Mr. A. G. Allen introduced a bill entitled "An act to legalize the official acts of David Earll, justice of the peace of the town of Tioga, county of Tioga," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on the judiciary.

Mr. Titus introduced a bill entitled "An act to permit the board of supervisors of Tompkins county, in its discretion, to compromise, adjust and pay certain claims arising from deficiencies in the Infant Heir fund," which was read the first time, and by unanimous consent was also read the second time, and referred to the committee on internal affairs.

Mr. Craft introduced a bill entitled "An act to amend the Penal Code" (§ 382), which was read the first time, and by unanimous

AN ACT

To authorize the appointment of commissioners to locate an asylum for the chronic insane in northern New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The governor is hereby authorized to appoint five commis-
2 sioners to select a suitable site in northern New York on which to erect an
3 asylum for the chronic insane.

1 § 2. The said commissioners shall have power to receive by gift or to
2 contract for the purchase of such site for the location of said asylum, subject,
3 however, to the approval of the next legislature, to whom they shall report
4 their action in the premises within ten days after the commencement of the
5 session, together with plans and estimates for constructing buildings suit-

6 able to accommodate five hundred inmates. Such plans to admit of such
7 further extension of the buildings as may be necessary to meet the future
8 requirements of the state in providing for this class of insane.

1 *§* 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
